- We are your community trust, created in 1988 from the sale of community shares in Auckland Savings Bank
- An endowment/pūtea, invested for the people of Auckland and Northland for generations to come
- For 2022/23, the granting budget was around ~\$70m, expecting a significantly lower budget in 2023/2024

Funding Exclusions and Limitations



The Foundation aims to be a broad community funder however, we recognise we cannot fund everything. Whilst the focus areas and theories of change identify priorities for funding, specified exclusions guide applicants in understanding what we are unlikely to fund or have limitations on funding, given the constraints of the grants budget.

Items we will not generally fund

- Costs that are regarded as being primarily the responsibility of central or local Government. We acknowledge however that many community building projects and iconic projects can only be funded in partnership with central and local government.
- Examples of items we will not fund (note: this is not an exhaustive list):
 - Schools including school facilities, school resources, school equipment, school classrooms, school uniforms, IT suites in schools and administration blocks, school halls, school swimming pools, school gardens, core curriculum delivery)
 - Programmes or resources into as part of the delivery of core curriculum
 - Centres
 - Individuals
 - Projects (including salaries of health Organisations, Districts, core primary healthcare, and dental)
 - and related clubs (including may occasionally fund projects to community. This is limited to the University's Foundation.
 - ambulance services
 - ed in the Weather Tight
 - nt or Council-controlled
 - stitutions
- Feasibility studies, needs analysis, project plan development, building consents, resource consents, Quantity Surveyor or architectural drawings
- Purchase of buildings
- Aged care facilities and services (Note: in some cases, we may consider initiatives that are owned and proposed by community, where there is no intention to sell to private owners)
- If Foundation North has provided a grant over \$1 million or has been at least a 50% funder of a large capital grant, it is unlikely to consider any further funding application within three years of the grant (Note: This will be built into the conditions of all building project grants over \$1m)
- Financial:
 - Retrospective funding
 - Debt repayment
 - Refinancing of existing loans
 - Endowments
- International costs:
 - Travel and other costs incurred overseas
 - Overseas aid
- Projects seeking to promote religious or political objectives
- Individuals
- Projects that create benefit, especially financially, for private owners (except for Nga Whenua Rahui legal agreements or land under QE II Covenant).
- Fundraising activities and organisations
- Funding to run conferences

Items we have limitations on

- Foodbanks - We will consider applications from foodbanks, up to a maximum of \$50,000.
- Organisations that focus on a single health issue - funding up to \$25,000 under Quick Response Grants will be considered.
- We will not fund operating costs at more than 30% of organisation's total expenditure (based on the previous year's financial statements).
- We will consider funding for sports uniforms and equipment for children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years, up to a maximum of \$10,000.

- \$25,000+
- No closing dates
- Multi-year applications
- We aim to give you a decision within five months of receiving a **complete** application

Kaupapa:

We support approaches that reduce discrimination and racism and increase social inclusion. Former refugees, new migrants (fewer than five years in New Zealand), rainbow communities and people living with a disability are our priority

Theory of Change: Whakahou Taiao | Regenerative Environment



Kaupapa:

We support joined-up approaches to conserving, restoring and renewing the environment so that Te Taiao and people can flourish together. Initiatives proposed by tangata whenua are our priority.

Mātauranga Māori (indigenous knowledge, practices and approaches) being recognised, valued and implemented

- Lastly, our team is here to work with you and support you!


